<u>Damadi Home</u> <u>Pastor Martin shares</u>

Currently, we have 20 children (11 boys and 9 girls). Six more children were added to the group this year who came from war-torn areas in Kabaw Valley. (Located in Sagaing Division north-west Myanmar near Indian border.) Now is monsoon season in Myanmar, and most of the children are facing dengue fever and diarrhea because of mosquitoes and weather changes. They continue their studies at the government school. The newcomers are still having problems catching up with their studies at school, and we hope their problems will settle down next year. I'm sending a new profile of the boys and girls and some photos of children from the Damadi home.

Because of Covid and the political crisis, our children have missed out on three school years during that time. Some of the older children think they're old enough to get a job outside and would like to stop their education. We encourage them to continue their studies, but we cannot hold some of them back from their desire to work. So, they left Damadi. Rebecca **Lalrawngbawli** is currently working in Oman as a domestic worker. **Biakthuama** went back to his village, and a few younger children

went back home to be with their guardians. Next year, I think 2-3 children will leave the home, and we might have to look at taking in some new children.

Kya Hae, who is the oldest at Damadi, wants to discontinue his studies next year and pursue vocational training in mechanics. I will be glad if there is anyone who would like to sponsor him for his vocational training and also for getting a new driving licence. I believe he will be very useful for driving the light truck from Damadi if he receives the driving licence.

Mary's parents will continue serving Damadi until 2025. Pastor Sanglura works part-time at Damadi Home and at our new resource centre called "Lighthouse Resource Centre". The primary purpose of the centre is to provide Lutheran resources and focus on training for church leaders in Yangon and other mission fields of the church such as Bago and Tahan.

<u>Urgent need for Back-up Solar</u> <u>System—</u> <u>from Pastor Martin</u>

The power shortage still exists, and the Damadi Home gets electricity for 14 hours per day, and blackouts happen very often in between. The generator is very useful, but since diesel is very expensive nowadays, it is impossible to use the generator for too long. When the electricity blacks out at night for more than 3 hours, the children are unable to study for long and have to sleep early in the dark. We are thinking about low-cost solarpowered electricity for the children and will be glad if there are donors for this important project. It will cost around USD\$500 for the solar panel, inverter, battery, and cables. (Approximately \$760 AUD) This solar system will give power for lighting for a couple of hours in the evening so students can get their studies done.

<u>Myanmar Institute of Lutheran</u> <u>Theology (MILT)</u> <u>Pastor Martin shares</u>

Due to the current political crisis and lack of infrastructure for MILT, the board has decided to move the opening of MILT to next year, 2024. We will try to recruit students next year. Due to security

reasons, we will think about opening the Bible school only when we have green light from the local authorities to keep the young people in the housing apartment in front of Damadi Home. All our students went back home, and some of them became PDF soldiers (People's Defence Force) and fought the military regime to protect their villages.
